From the church



Dear friends

Since taking on the role of Area Dean of Newark and Southwell I have become even more aware of how wrong information gets about – Fake News as we have come to know it. Various Facebook pages and other social media are becoming famous for the speed of its communication, but not always its accuracy. The lesson is clearly that we need to check our facts and not just believe everything we are told. This is a principle that applies to everything.

It may surprise some to read that it applies to our faith. It is no good believing something just because someone said you should. What use is a faith that is swallowed without question? It is perfectly reasonable and sensible to ask for supporting evidence. Nothing plays into the hands of those who oppose and snigger at the Christian Church than the inability to say why we believe what we believe.

The greatest evidence is the Church itself. How could it have survived the centuries of repeated human failing (and sometimes downright corruption) if it were simply a human invention? Somehow the Church has survived all the challenges it has faced (and its internal failures) and continues to grow world-wide. It goes on talking about the love of God. It is evidence that it is the Church of God and the means whereby people come to know the love of Jesus Christ and to know his presence, not just as a theoretical idea, but in their experience of life.

When it comes to some of the teaching of our Christian faith, such as the Sermon on the Mount*, can anyone improve on it? What a revolution there would be if the whole world followed what was taught there! It would change the world and sort out all our current conflicts. It is a pretty good reason for trying to follow Jesus Christ.

We can and we should ask questions and probe the issues. It is a good thing to do because it equips us better to stand up for our faith when we hear it derided or criticised. It is good also because it strengthens our beliefs. We need to be confident in our faith. The Church needs to be ready with the reasons and evidence for believing in Jesus Christ... and that is the job of all of us who have been baptised into Christ.

Let us then with boldness proclaim with joy the faith of the Church: Alleluia! Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

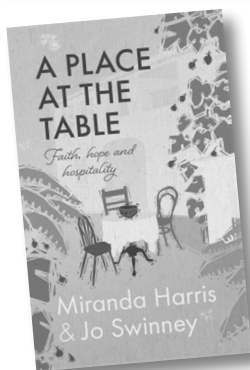

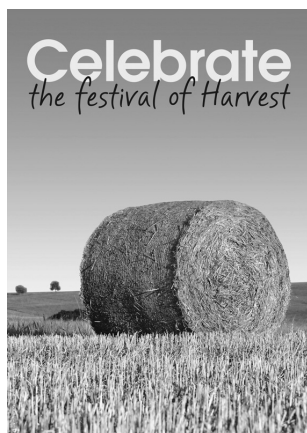

Safer Neighbourhoods Group

There was a meeting of the Safer Neighbourhoods Group NG on 28 July in South Muskham Village Hall.

Phone cabling at Maplebeck has been stolen in a second such attack. Once again the target seems to have been the copper cable but considerable damage was also done to the fibre optic cables. Police are investigating two suspicious "cable-men" reported in the village earlier.

The electricity sub-station at Staythorpe was attacked and some very heavy cabling stolen. The weight must have required several people to manhandle it and some transport to remove it from the site. Police are investigating the report of a suspicious van seen in the area.

Police have found a significant cannabis farm in Averham.

At Carlton Wharf up to 60 young people are meeting, by electronic arrangement, to have noisy fun and swim in the tidal river. There is an obvious risk of a drowning under these circumstances. Additionally there have been instances of anti-social behaviour, abuse and even physical assault aimed at residents and fishermen trying to intervene. There is also now a litter problem on this private land for the landowners to clear up.

From both Cromwell and Kneesall there are reports of a few, but noisy, vehicles speeding out of both villages very early on week-day mornings. The locations will be added to the police patrol notices but the police need the immediate report of a registration number in order to take effective action.

At Norwell the store in the sports field has been attacked and the contents vandalized for the second time. On this occasion there seems to have been an attempt at arson.

In Ossington a large quantity of used cooking oil in containers was fly-tipped in Laxton Lane.

The Police wish to emphasise the need for speedy reporting to 101 of incidents such as aggressive peddlers so that timely action can be taken. Residents are also asked to be particularly careful about any ignition source in the countryside under the current drought conditions. There have been some field fires at Bilsthorpe which may have initiated by human carelessness.

Heritage Open Days

The National Holocaust Museum and Gardens at Laxton will be taking part on Friday 9 September and Monday 11 to Friday 16 September inclusive between 10am and 4.30pm (last entry 3.30pm). Established over 25 years ago as Britain's first ever place of Holocaust remembrance and learning, the centre has beautiful memorial gardens and powerful exhibitions.

FARMING *Watch*

It is often said that farmers are never satisfied with the weather – it's too hot, too cold, too wet, too dry. However 2022 has really tested even the most pragmatic of farmers!

Autumn cereals were drilled in good conditions in 2021 and looked promising for most of their growth stages. The prolonged spell of dry weather changed expectations. The ears of grain obviously require moisture to grow and swell, with the aim to be around 15% moisture when harvested (or after artificial drying following harvest). Due to the excessive heat, some local farmers combined corn last month during the night when moisture from dew would be expected. Instead, on testing, grain was at 9% and even nocturnal harvesting had to be temporarily halted. On one or two of the hottest days, it wasn't possible to send wheat into commercial storage as it represented a fire risk until it had cooled – its temperature after combining was over 35 degrees! These figures are completely exceptional, especially in our 'maritime' climate, and, repeated across the country, are part of the reason why there have been a number of combine and field fires reported.

Just as in a garden it is not sensible to drill seed until there is a certain level of moisture in the soil. Fingers crossed the weather does not now become too wet after having been too dry!

NATURE *Watch*

With scorching July and August temperatures, September brings a much-needed cold snap marking the beginning of Autumn. With the damper, cooler weather, September is the month to start your hunt for wild mushrooms. Mushrooms are classified as members of the kingdom fungi, a vast and diverse kingdom including around 144,000 known species of which yeasts, mildews and moulds are also included. Mushrooms (and toadstools) are actually the 'fruiting bodies' that produce spores, allowing them to reproduce. With increased rainfall providing moisture to the soil, coupled with the warm ground, airborne spores land on the moist soil and germinate.

There are around 15,000 different types of wild fungi that can be found in the UK. Fungi are extremely important to our ecosystems as they are saprobionts that release enzymes from their cells that break down dead and decaying plant and animal matter in the environment. This increases the availability of these nutrients in the soil which the fungi can absorb and use these molecules to grow. In doing so, fungi carry out the important process of decomposition.

Fungi are also extremely important medically. Probably the most famous

fungus used in medicine is penicillin, however many other types have antibacterial, antiviral and even antifungal properties. Recent studies have discovered specific mushrooms that have anti-tumour, anti-inflammatory and also immunostimulant properties, in particularly increasing macrophage and natural killer cell activity.

Shrouded in folklore, mushrooms such as the fly agaric are commonly found clustered in circles, called fairy rings. According to myth, these are the sites where the fairy people or Fae dance after a rainstorm, however beware mortals as they may be taken to the fairy realm if they enter.

Fungi come in many shapes, colours and sizes and in the UK, there are relatively few poisonous mushrooms. That said however, many will cause sickness if touched or ingested, and harmful mushrooms can look very similar to poisonous mushrooms. Therefore, unless you're experienced in mushroom identification and foraging, it is best proceed with caution and observe them from a distance, otherwise you may find yourself either violently ill, or under a Fae spell and fall asleep for a hundred years!

BIRD *Watch*

The heat continues and, amongst other damage, it has taken its toll on the bird life. Chicks are not able to withstand unusually high temperatures and the lack of moisture has reduced the number of insect species on which some birds feed. We watched the lone survivor of a late brood of French partridge struggling to drink but eventually it disappeared.

Harvest time illustrates the need to feed birds selectively so that they do not become totally dependent on garden feeders. There is now enough spillage lying after combines have passed for grain feeders to be satisfied and it should be less necessary to top up the feed points. Clearly the availability of water is still more important than supplementary food.

We have noticed that when they first come to food points, chicks are very selective and tend to scatter larger grains and maize on the ground, to the benefit of the ground feeding birds. It is likely that their small crops will not process larger items of food.

Dunnock and robins have reappeared on the lawns after the breeding season and it seems that the early broods were successful. After an absence of two years, peregrine falcons have been seen again circling one of the local nest sites which was used for several broods, though it was not known if they were mature or immature birds. However other local sites have housed broods again this year.

The most unusual report is from a friend who, over the space of 20 minutes, watched a squirrel playing with a magpie. During that time the bird and the squirrel were alternately hopping onto a garden table, from that onto a chair, and so onto the ground. There were no signs of aggression and the bird gave every impression of having fun. We only have to watch dogs and cats to know that animals enjoy play, but for two species to interact in this way is quite unusual.

RAIN *Watch*

The July weather story was dominated by the new highest ever UK temperature recorded, not so far away, in Coningsby Lincolnshire of 40.3°C.

Here we battled to keep plants alive, the feeling of having an alien heat amongst a familiar land-scape was surreal. It was not helped by the fact the landscape was taking on a 1976 appearance: after the third driest June in Norwell we had easily the driest July in 16 years, getting just 37% of the expected rainfall – 2.3 cm (0.9 in) instead of the average 6.2 cm (2.5 in). One third of this rain came on the last day of July.

Trees and bushes in hedgerows are suffering and we must expect stressed plants to become more susceptible to diseases with Ash Die Back taking hold more quickly. It is shocking and worrying seeing global warming showing its hand in Norwell.

Caunton Local History Society

As summer draws to a close we start to look forward to our programme of talks for 2022/23. To kick off the season we welcome Stephen Flinders who will introduce us to Catherine Crompton (nee Mee). Catherine married George Crompton (pictured) and so married into one of Derbyshire's wealthiest banking families. She already had two children when in 1867 she began to keep a diary which she continued to write until the death of her husband in 1897. She was a Victorian wife and a mother who gave birth to 11 children, but was there more to her story than first appears?

Join us at Dean Hole School, Caunton on Tuesday 13 September at 7.30pm for what promises to be an intriguing presentation.

Why not become a member of Caunton Local History Society. New members are especially welcome and attending your first talk with the society is free. The cost for returning non-members is £3. We always meet on the second Tuesday of each month and almost always at Dean Hole School. We look forward to welcoming you.

The Society's annual trip was on 9 August and this year we travelled to Cambridge for a guided tour of St. John's College followed by free time to explore Cambridge. For some this meant a punt on the Cam and for others a leisurely lunch followed by a visit to the Fitzwilliam Museum for a David Hockney exhibition. Whatever the choice a fun day was had by all.

The site of what is now St. John's College was once home to a monastic house – a "Hospital of St John" which by the 16th century had fallen into disrepair. Bishop John Fisher, a friend of Lady Margaret Beaufort, mother of King Henry VII, persuaded her to build a college in place of the old hospital. Although Lady Margaret died in 1509, the foundation of the College went ahead two years later, in 1511. Originally all the necessary accommodation was focused around a single court, which included a Dining Hall and Kitchen, Chapel, Library, and rooms for students. Over the centuries the College gradually expanded. Second Court was built in 1599-1601 and a magnificent library (now the Old Library) was added in 1624-8. By the mid-19th century the College had expanded across the River Cam with the building of its famous Bridge of Sighs and New Court (1826-31).

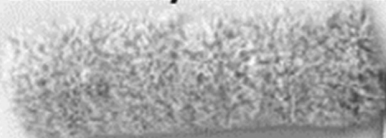

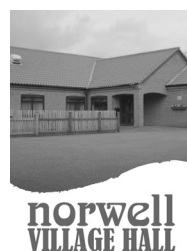

His opening comment was 'An interesting church allowed long to remain in a very poor condition, but now undergoing a thorough and apparently judicious restoration'. It had indeed been in a very poor condition, almost beyond repair, but as we see now it was saved.

Glynne visited 130 other churches in Nottinghamshire and the Thoroton Society has just produced an edition of all these notes. On 10 August the society met in Norwell church to launch the book. It was a very cheerful occasion with short talks, a buffet lunch and followed by a shortened walk in the village on a very hot afternoon.

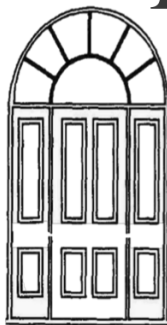
