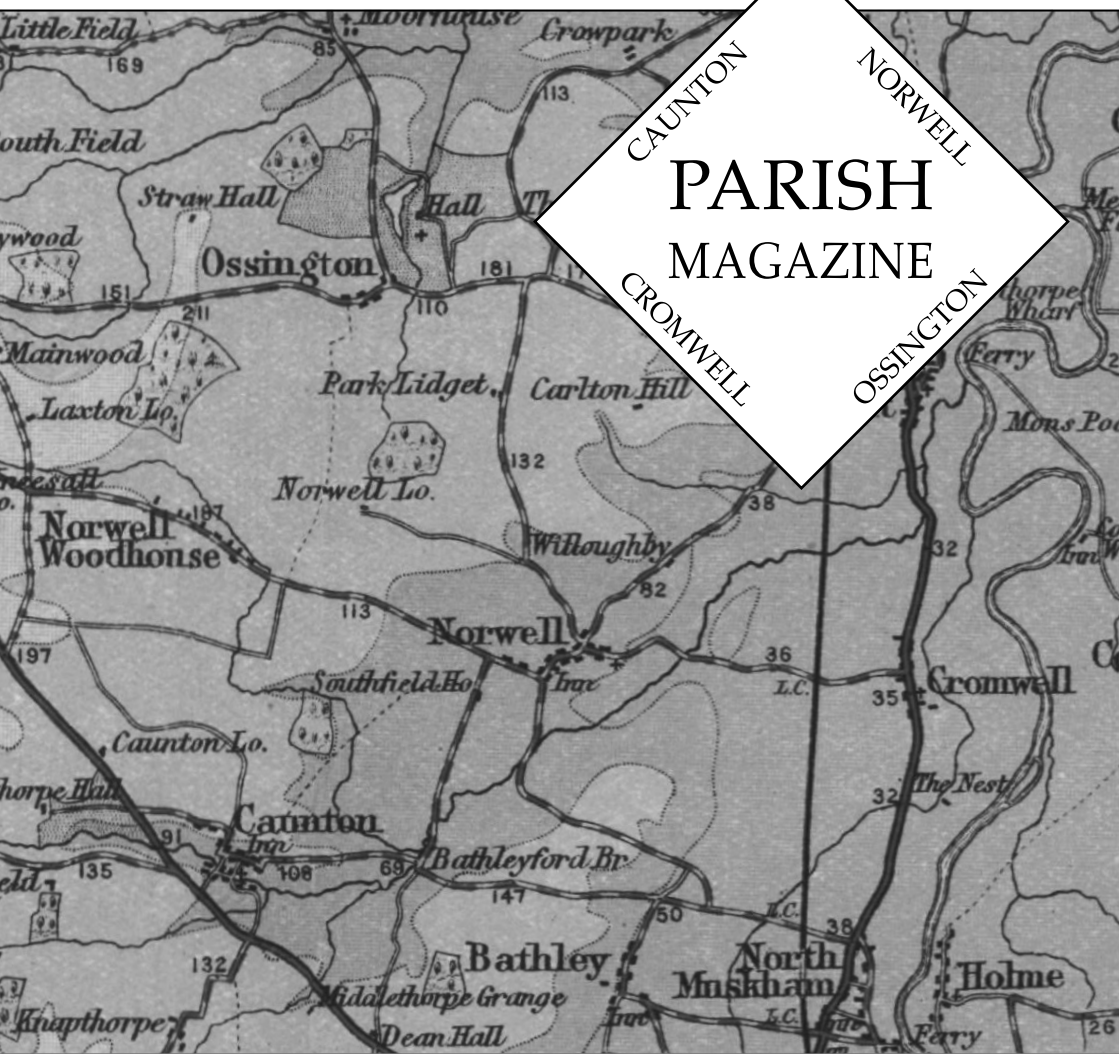

From the church



One of the things I enjoy about living in a rural village is the rhythm of the agricultural year all around us. The seasons of preparing ground and planting, of new life and growth, of pruning and harvesting – all seem to echo the rhythms of our lives.



The Christian calendar offers a rhythm of seasons and festivals which tell the story of God's involvement in our lives and world – how God chose to come and live amongst us which we celebrate at Christmas; how his son Jesus died and was raised to new life which we give thanks for at Easter, so we might begin a new season of friendship with God in our lives today!

NATURE *Watch*

An eagle-eyed Norwell resident recently spotted a common lizard making its way down Main Street. The UK has six native species of reptile – three snakes and three lizards. Being cold-blooded (ectothermic), reptiles require the sun's thermal energy to regulate their body temperature and need to bask in the sunlight before beginning their search for food. Britain's changeable and relatively cool climate is not ideal when warmth is needed to start your day!

As the name suggests, common lizards are the most common reptile in the UK and in fact the most northerly species of terrestrial reptile, ranging from northern Europe across central Asia towards Russia. As this home range includes Siberia, the common lizard can survive extremely low temperatures and has been found in a frozen, super-cooled state at temperatures below -10°C . As an exclusive carnivore, the common lizard's diet consists of insects, flies and other invertebrates and it is fast-moving and agile. The common lizard is also known as 'the viviparous lizard': the species' scientific name, *Zootoca vivipara* (formerly *Lactera vivipara*), translates to 'live birth' as the lizard gives birth to live young. In colder climates this reproductive strategy is most common as the female can keep embryos warmer growing within her body than she would be able to incubate eggs within a nest.

Around 16cm in length, common lizards are susceptible to predation from a variety of predators including birds, cats, foxes and other larger reptiles. If caught, these lizards can shed their tails in a process called autotomy to avoid being a predator's next meal. The still-moving tail distracts the predator for long enough to allow the lizard to make a quick getaway. The lizard can then regenerate a new tail, albeit shorter than the original, and this is made of cartilage rather than bone. The tail is regenerated using existing cells that have the amazing ability to de-differentiate into stem cells that then specialise into the cells required to replace those in the tail. These stem cells allow lizards to regenerate skin cells after wounds without scarring, and even brain cells. I think we humans could benefit from this ability!

RAIN *Watch*

April has, traditionally, been the driest month of the year in Norwell but this year we had nearly twice (190%) the expected 2.7 cm (1.1 in): 5.1 cm (2 in) of rain fell.

As March was also wet the past two months have been the third wettest March/April combination in 17 years. 2012 was also

notably wet with 17.2 cm (6.8 in) of rain in April alone.

In spite of the dry February we have now had 5% more rain than expected by the end of April.

BIRD *Watch*

The problems of assessing the impact of climate change, agriculture, other land use and influences on wildlife have just been illustrated quite clearly. The RSPB reports the continuous decline in the number of skylarks, attributing much of the responsibility to modern farming regimes. Yet this week a bird lover in Norwell observed that walks over arable land in these parishes are made even more enjoyable by the volume of skylark song and many of us will agree. Much the same might be said of reports about lapwing, starling, house sparrows and some other birds on the Red List. Rather than using these statistics to apportion blame, perhaps it would be more constructive to discover why populations can thrive locally, while being threatened nationally and even globally.

A third of the way into May, it is clear that the Spring migration, far from restoring the number of birds which we normally welcome, is only emphasising international concern about declining bird populations. There are few swallows and fewer house-martins here; chaffinch, blackcap and whitethroat are scarce and the most numerous garden birds are those which are resident – blue, great and coal-tits, robin and blackbird. It seems that, as the climate warms, flight muscles have become stronger allowing some migrating birds to

seek out breeding grounds further North than their traditional sites. This might explain why cuckoo, spotted flycatcher and willow warbler – species which used to be common – are seldom seen here but are to be found in reasonable numbers in Scotland and Northern England.

Two stories of nesting neighbours have been told. At Norwell, where jackdaws nest in the church tower and tawny owls have occupied a nesting box sited in the churchyard, a recent inspection showed that jackdaws had taken over the box. It is not known if the owls have moved on to another site leaving the box to the jackdaws or if the new residents have ousted the owls.

Near Moorhouse a pair of peregrine falcon has nested on one arm of an electricity pylon for several years. The peregrine have not yet returned but a pair of raven has taken up residence on the other arm.

Most corvids are not only strong birds but can be aggressive and it is possible that both the Norwell owls and the Moorhouse peregrine found themselves ousted.

A Caunton resident sent a photograph of a ring-ouzel in his garden, not a first but a rare sighting here. Like a large blackbird with a white bib, the ouzel breeds on moorland and visits farmland on migration.

FARMING *Watch*

'Cold wet May, plenty of corn and hay' is an old saying with quite a degree of truth. Just as rain in May boosts growth and flowers in the garden so it also affects the crops in the fields in the following months.

Modern dairy cows have been bred to produce more milk than is needed to raise one calf. As a result they require a very specific balance of protein and energy (carbohydrate) in their diets to produce that extra milk. If that balance is off, the function of their rumen (the largest of their four stomachs and the one where most of the conversion from food to useable nutrition happens) is compromised. Unhappy rumen = unhappy cow, and possibly unhealthy cow.

Most dairy cows are easy to balance by giving them the correct nutritionally-balanced feed. For grass-fed cows that balance all needs to happen in the grass. Protein is not that difficult – early spring grass and clovers, while in their first burst of growth, can produce high protein levels. High energy hay needs to be harvested early (in June) while it is still in a fast-growing vegetative state ie grasses before they start forming seedheads and legumes (clovers) before they start flowering. Also, once a grass plant starts to produce a stem and seedhead, the hay begins to lignify (i.e. become woody) and not only protein and energy levels but also the digestibility and the palatability of the hay drops significantly. This ultimately affects milk yield.

So there is always a balance to be struck. Vigorous grass growth generally affects the nutritional value of the crop although the quantity harvested may be greater, which helps to offset the imbalance to some extent. Better quality hay and silage is obviously preferable but there may be insufficient quantity. This is part of the reason why farming is often said to be more an art than a science. Judgement, often the result of a lifetime's experience, is key!

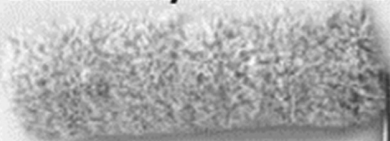

Cromwell Parish Meeting

On Monday 17 April the parish held the AGM. Cllr Sue Saddington was present with only four parishioners.

Planning decisions are still awaited from NCC concerning the Cemex plans both north and south of the village. Similarly Cllr Saddington informed the meeting that the proposed solar farm at Foxholes Farm, Vicarage Lane in North Muskham parish, is being held up. Amongst many other strong objections, Highways have refused to support the application due to the difficulties over transport routing of the HGV construction traffic. Equally, there has been no decision from N&SDC about the long-proposed EV charging unit at the OK Diner.

Finance. The treasurer, Mrs Marjorie Goss, reported on the details of the financial year (which are now exhibited on the parish noticeboard). The year ended with the parish holding a total of £1,821.52. The accounts, financial safeguards and auditing procedures were all formally accepted by the meeting. Mr D. Pointing subsequently agreed to be the internal auditor.

Despite appeals there were no other nominations for any of the positions of parish officer and so the current parish officers were re-elected for yet another year. This is a very unhealthy situation for the meeting.

A complaint was made about speeding vehicles along Norwell Lane and it was agreed to refer this to the police via the Safer Neighbourhoods Group.

The next Parish Meeting probably will be on Monday 10 July at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

- Thank you to everyone who made our service of celebration for the coronation such a joyous occasion. By working with the Potting Shed we were able to combine the traditional and the new in an inspiring way.
- Thank you to all those who worked really hard in the Big Help Out. They swept into the church and churchyard with enthusiasm. The spiders cowered and the ivy quaked – and were vanquished! There was a wonderful feeling of unity as we worked together.

There is something special about working together and keeping the church as a living part of the parish. But there is so much more we could be doing. We are aware that in the words of the General Confession 'We have left undone those things which we ought to have done'. Do read the cry for help in Norwell community news. We do need continuing help most particularly with the fabric of this magnificent building.

What's happening in June?

It feels as though we are going to have a summery time. Let's hope the weather is listening! The first week is Nature in Churchyards week and we are looking forward to welcoming the school to the churchyard to discover some of the amazing things that are there.

The owl box has been examined again this year. Sadly, there is no evidence that owls have been using it, but there were three jackdaw eggs there. Perhaps the tower has got overcrowded with jackdaws and doves so they are nesting elsewhere.

Sponsor a new owl box: we have been told that the owl box needs replacing as it is getting old. Would anyone like to sponsor an owl box for £20?

On Sunday 11 June we will have our regular service of Holy Communion at 10.00am.

The month ends with the weekend when Norwell opens its gardens – a very splendid event. The church will be joining in by having 'flower' arrangements which will consist entirely of foliage, all of which will be coming from within the parish. If you have anything we could use please get in touch with Elizabeth.

Coinciding with the Open Gardens will be an exhibition of landscape photographs in the church. The pictures will be in church between Saturday 24 and Friday 30 June and the church will be open between 10.00am and 4.30pm and on Wednesday until 9.00pm. All are welcome to drop in and have a look.

St Laurence's Church Our Perilous Future – Immediate Action Needed

The annual church meetings were held on 20 April. No candidates stood for the position of Churchwarden. A Parochial Church Council (PCC) was formed, largely comprising members of the outgoing PCC, with two new members joining. The PCC is the committee that is responsible for running and maintaining the church.

Our Treasurer resigned after many years in post and our Secretary asked to step down. Both have served loyally, worked hard and will be missed. We have recruited a new Secretary and an acting Treasurer. A permanent Treasurer is, however, needed. Elizabeth Jones who has run and served the church faithfully for many years no longer has the capacity to do all that is required to keep the church functioning.

The Challenge

St Laurence's is a very large Grade One Listed building with a large churchyard. The ongoing maintenance and care of the building is becoming beyond the means of the PCC and a small, declining and ageing congregation.

The church will shortly require rewiring, a new heating system, redecorating and refurbishment of the organ; plus work on the stonework of the tower. This will require substantial work to secure grants, raise funds and to secure and manage contractors. This is beyond the capacity of the PCC.

A Solution?

The only solution the PCC can see is to request the support of the community – for village residents, working with the PCC and under the guidance of the church architect, to take a lead in managing the building, raising funds for its restoration and upkeep and exploring other uses.

The church is currently used for other purposes – church members organise concerts and exhibitions for example. Such uses could be developed further and new uses explored and developed, for example an occasional community café and champing.

We are interested in exploring whether a “Friends of St Laurence's Church” model would be an appropriate approach to support St Laurence's Church to manage the building and raise funds for the works required. Alternatively individuals may want to agree to lead key tasks, working with the PCC and the church architect. Volunteers do not need to be churchgoers or Christians. The PCC would continue to arrange regular services and ensure that St Laurence's operated as a church.

What next?

To outline our challenge and determine how the village community could support St Laurence's Church, the PCC is hosting an open meeting at on Wednesday 7 June at 7.30pm in the church. If you are interested in the future of St Laurence's Church, please come along. If you cannot come but are interested in taking a lead on a particular task please let Adrian Anderson know: andersonassociates@btopenworld.com.

The Alternative

If we are not able to secure additional support, the PCC is very unlikely to be able to continue and to keep St Laurence's functioning. The future of St Laurence's would then be determined by the Diocese.

St Laurence's has served Norwell for over 1,000 years. We hope it will continue to be a part of the village in the years ahead. The decision rests with us all.
